With all the mandates and restrictions starting to ease due to the drop in COVID cases, we are excited to see the start of public events returning! There are a few events coming up in the month of March:

For parades, we have a St. Patrick's Day Parade scheduled for <u>March 17th from 11:30am to 1:00pm</u>. We also have a National Vietnam Veteran's Day Parade scheduled for <u>March 29th from 5:30pm to 8:00pm</u>. For both parades, Kalakaua Avenue will be closed from Saratoga Road to Monsarrat Avenue. Please be mindful and plan your trips accordingly.

For festivals, we have the Oahu Festival scheduled for <u>March 12th from 2:00pm to midnight</u> (12:00am). Kalakaua Avenue will be closed from Seaside Avenue to Uluniu Avenue. Again, please be mindful and plan your trips accordingly.

Other Events

There have been a number of motor vehicle tragedies occurring across the island. Even within our own Waikiki District we recently had an accident involving a mother and her child that were hit by a vehicle while walking within a marked crosswalk. To help raise awareness and to encourage everyone to drive with Aloha, we are hosting a sign waving event near the intersection of Kalakaua Avenue and Kaiulani Avenue. We will be partnering with community leaders and programs to help promote traffic safety. This event will be held on <u>March 10th from 5:00pm to 6:00pm</u>.

SAFETY TIP: BEACH SAFETY

Aloha everyone, I hope you all are doing well! Spring is right around the corner which means more time in the ocean. As many flock to the beach we've decided for this month's safety tip, to share ways to keep your belongings safe and what to do if your property is taken. To begin, whether you're a local resident or visiting our island, please leave your valuables at home or in a secure place wherever you're staying. If you need to bring certain valuables with you to the beach (i.e. phone, wallet, keys) a great investment to keep your belongings safe is a bag or pouch that you can bring into the water. If you do have to leave valuables on the beach leave them in an area that is visible to you while you're in the ocean.

If you notice a suspicious person on the beach or someone that seems to be looking in to other people's things, please notify the nearest lifeguard or call 911. If 911 is called, an officer will make checks of the area. Do your best to be observant of anything that can be unique to identifying this suspicious person. Things to be aware of are their hair cut or hair color, tattoos, or particular clothing (i.e. bright shirt or a certain design on their clothing). As much as possible, please keep your distance and don't confront this person for your personal safety. Lastly, if you find that your property is missing, it's best to call 911 as soon as you can to file a report.
