RECAP OF LAST MONTH

April 2022

It's crazy how fast time is flying by with everything starting back up again. The month of April came and went so quickly! Our team has been busy with fielding various questions / concerns from the community and also have been participating with various community events.

During this month, we met with students from the University of Hawaii at Manoa through the help of Annalisa Burgos. We discussed what our unit does for the community and how our unit assists patrol. We also addressed various topics and concerns the students had. Overall the time spent with these students was very enjoyable and we hoped to speak with them again very soon.

We also participated with the American Diabetes Association's Step Out - Walk to Stop Diabetes event. During this event, we provided safety information and allowed attendees to try our Drunk Buster Goggles. These goggles help simulate the effects of being under the influence of alcohol in various stages. A big shout out to Amber Burgos and her team for allowing us the opportunity to participate with their event!

We also want to give a shout out to Taryn Wells, Dadia Ellis, and the staff of Waikiki Aquarium for allowing us to participate in their Mauka to Makai Environment Expo. The event helped provide resources and valuable information on how to protect the environment. At the event, we were able to provide almost 100 Keiki IDs to the keiki that were participating in the event. It was also a great opportunity to share various safety tips with the keiki and to be able to just talk story with them.

Our unit has also been made aware of various incidents and concerns surrounding homeless issues and crime that has been occurring within the Waikiki District. One of the things we continue to do is build relationships with community partners to help address the homeless issues and conduct outreach throughout the district. Although sometimes it takes awhile, we do have success with transitioning folks off the streets into more permanent housing situations with the help of these partners. Other things we continue to do is look at various ways we can help raise public awareness on how to protect yourself and the importance of reporting crime / suspicious activity. We are hoping to provide a seminar in the upcoming months to help provide the information, so stay tuned for that!
